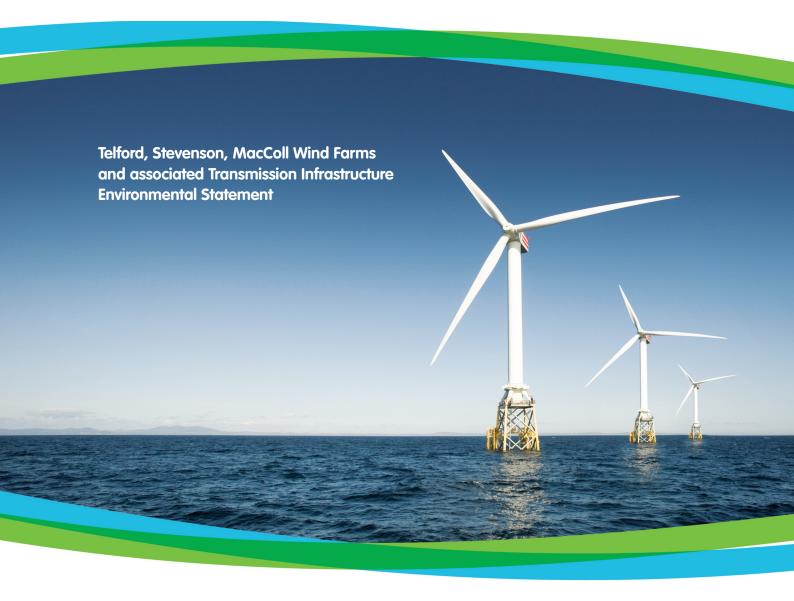

#### Moray Offshore Renewables Ltd Start Consultation on Development of Wind Energy In The Outer Moray Firth

**UK**, **August 20**, **2010**. Moray Offshore Renewables Ltd published their Environmental Impact Assessment Scoping Report which provides plans for the development of between 1000 and 1140MW of wind power in the outer Moary Firth, some 22km (13.5 miles) from the Caithness Coast. This is the first phase of a development which could ultimately deliver 1 500MW of power – the equivalent capacity to a large conventional thermal powerstation.

The Scoping Report is available for public consultation until 30 November, and a series of 12 public consultation events will be held in towns and villages from Wick to Peterhead on Scotland's North East Coast.

#### Project Director, Dan Finch said:

"Our proposal to work in deeper waters (30m-60m) uses Scotland's deep-water engineering expertise from the North Sea to allow us to develop wind power some 22km away from the coast, taking advantage of available space on the sea-bed for construction, and an excellent wind resource.

"This technology builds on the pioneering work of the already operational Beatrice Demonstrator turbines, and will make the Highlands and the North-East a world – leader in offshore renewable technology, as well as offering the chance to significantly increase the amount of electricity produced by renewables, and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

#### 3. The Crown Estate Wind Leasing Programme

In September 2008, The Crown Estate invited tenders for the development of offshore wind as part of the Round Three Offshore Wind Farm Leasing Programme. The invitation was for the exclusive rights to work with The Crown Estate in the development of offshore wind generation in specified zones. These zones are located around the UK coastline, including the Irish Sea, and the Bristol Channel, and their development is aimed to deliver up to 25GW of generating capacity, representing as much as one quarter of the UK's electricity requirements by 2020.

On 8 January 2010, The Crown Estate announced the successful development partners for each zone, and signed an exclusive zone development agreement with Moray Offshore Renewables Limited as their partner to develop upwards of 1.3GW of wind energy in Zone 1 – which is located on the Smith Bank, in the Moray Firth, around 13 miles from the Caithness coast.

This provides plans for the development of between 1,000 and 1,140 megawatts of wind power in the outer Moray Firth, more than 13.5 miles from the Caithness coast.



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

### Scheme for world's biggest offshore windfarm in firth

The world's biggest offshore windfarm could be created in the Moray Firth, it emerged last night. About 400 turbines are planned for a North Sea site between Caithness and Lossiemouth.

The two multimillion-pound projects, which could lead to hundreds of jobs, are expected to generate enough electricity to power almost two million homes.

The neighbouring windfarms have been proposed by green energy companies Moray Offshore Renewables and Beatrice Offshore Windfarm.

Yesterday plans for the Moray Offshore venture were unveiled in Peterhead as part of a lengthy public consultation exercise, which will continue along the coast this week.

Representatives of the firm, which is a partnership between EDP Renewables and SeaEnergy Renewables, said they hoped to begin work on the first of around 200 three-blade turbines in five years' time.

The farm could begin generating power – between 1,000 and 1,140MW – by 2016.

Stakeholder manager Craig Milroy said: "There is no existing windfarm in the world that is as big as this. This is a major venture for the North Sea."

He said feedback from the public would be used to put together an application for consent to the Scottish Government.

"So far the response from the public has been overwhelmingly positive," he said.

"We have already spoken to hundreds of people and will continue to hold consultation exercises along the Moray Firth

"We have been working closely with each local authority in the area and have contacted every councillor who has a coastal ward.

"It's been a massive exercise, but we take consultation very seriously."

He said that the venture would create a significant number of jobs, although it was too early to say exactly how many.

Moray could attract a "significant number of long-term jobs" if plans to instal 200 turbines in the Moray Firth are approved by the government.

The structures could potentially generate enough power for 750,000 homes.

If ministers approve the application from Moray Offshore Renewables Ltd (MORL), 200 deep-water turbines, positioned nearly 200ft below the surface, would be positioned 13-14 miles from the coast.

MORL stakeholder manager Craig Milroy said it was too early to say exactly how many jobs would be created but insisted long-term jobs would come out of it.

He said: "There will be a significant number of long-term jobs created, as well as fabrication jobs. Maintenance and operation staff will be needed as this project has a lifespan of 50 years."

He added: "This is a world first. It would be the biggest construction of my generation, and an opportunity to develop skills which will be valuable and exportable."


Mr Milroy added that the company was about two years away from submitting an application to the Scottish Government. If approved, construction would not begin for at least three years.

Representatives from MORL were on hand at the St Giles Centre at Elgin to answer questions about the project.

Mr Milroy said: "It was extremely successful. We received a very positive response from the people of Elgin and the surrounding area. This was the largest turnout of the tour we have undertaken."

About 100 people attended the drop-in session to hear more about the project. The group has conducted 11 other consultations at locations including Inverness, Wick, Inverness and Banff.

MORL will return to conduct a further consultation at Buckie Town House on October 11, from noon to 8pm.

## Wind turbines in Moray Firth can bring big benefits, say developers

A large offshore project in the Moray Firth could bring "significant opportunities" to the area, developers said last night.

Community leaders and locals gathered at Buckie Town House to speak to representatives from Moray Offshore Renewables Ltd (MORL).

The company wants to instal 200 power turbines in the Moray Firth and the structures could potentially generate enough power for 750,000 homes.

If MORL's application to the Scottish Government is approved, the deep-water turbines would be positioned nearly 200ft below the surface, about 13 to 14 miles off the Moray coast.

Yesterday's drop-in consultation gave locals an overview of the plans, and offered people the chance to give their views on the proposals.

MORL has conducted 12 other meetings at locations including Elgin, Banff and Inverness.

Members of the Buckie Regeneration Group are keen for MORL to use the town as a base during the construction phase and beyond.

Buckie councillor Gordon McDonald, who is also the chairman of the regeneration group, said that the town's harbour had the capacity for such a project.

He added: "There's scope for people to expand there, as there are not many other users. It's also owned by the council, which is convenient."

Craig Milroy of MORL said the company was "very interested" in the opportunities to develop at Buckie.

#### URGED TO ERGY CASH

BUCKIE and the surrounding area have been urged to claim their share of a £4 billion renewable energy cash bonanza.

The Town House played host last Monday from 12 noon to 8.00pm to a roadshow event run by Moray Offshore Renewables Ltd (MORL) concerning ambitious plans which could see

a 200-turbine offshore windfarm constructed 13.5 miles off the Moray coast.

Running the roadshow was MORL's Stake-holder Manager Craig Milroy, who highlighted that the firm were currently seeking to glean views from the public about the scheme. He stressed that the project was still in its early

stages.
"We were granted the right by the Crown Estate to develop Zone 1 [the area earmarked for the project] of the Round Three Offshore Windfarm Leasing Pro-

"This will be a two-year process and by the end of this we will be in a position to give people a clearer idea of what the windfarm will look like.

"We have held a 13-centre tour round the Moray coast, including Buckie, so that the general public can be involved in this process, and so far we have had very positive feedback.

Overall we have spoken to around 1000 people and generally they have been extremely positive and enthusiastic

"Many people were looking for some form of understanding as to what the economic benefits of the windfarm would be. "It is also important

that people understand this is a very different type of project to an onshore windfarm and sage which has got through."

With the Crown Estate's refusal to lease the neces sary land to Moray Council scuppering the Dallachy halting site plans, Mrs Howe told the meeting that a variety of misgivings over the plans remained to be answered and she went on to call for the Council to take responsibility as the landowner for Stonies Bridge and bury the scheme.

"Without being site specific there are a number of concerns about the principle of halting sites which have not been addressed," she said. "Firstly, how they going to be policed - Chanonry [a authorised halting site, now defunct], a good site satisfying a need saw over £500,000 go down the drain due to lack of control by the authorities on the doorstep; how will this work on a rural site?

Secondly, what happens to overspill - will this

HARBOURS in Moray need to be promoted if they are to attract more investment from the offshore renewables industry, say councillors.

The potential for jobs is "huge" if they can make the most of their commercial prospects, according to members of the local authority's audit and performance review committee.

Councillors discussed a report yesterday which warned that increasing storm damage could leave steps, pontoons and piers beyond repair.

They agreed that the structures were an asset to the area and required attention to "increase income and expand usage".

The interest of Moray Offshore Renewables Ltd (MORL) in the area was also discussed.

The company has applied to the Scottish Government to position deepwater turbines nearly 200ft under water about 13 to 14 miles off the Moray coast.

Members of the Buckie Regeneration Group are keen for MORL to use the town's harbour as a base.

Buckie councillor Joe Mackay said: "We must build on the commercial viability of the harbour."

Fellow ward councillor and committee chairman Gordon McDonald said the council needed to "market" the harbours. He said: "In the past we have waited for people to come to us. We missed out on the oil boom."

Mr McDonald added: "Renewables are not just about Buckie. The potential for jobs is huge."

The Council's deputy convener, Allan Wright believes the budget announcement

The reduction is about 2.6 per cent, but we have dis-covered that the £1m to continue the Council Tax freeze in Moray is not an extra but is

included in the local authority allocation.
"Precise figures for Moray will emerge
over the next few weeks but it looks as if we over the next few weeks but it looks as if we will have to save £8 million - or four per cent - in the year ahead. That is not impossible but it will be painful, not least considering a range of budget pressures including an extra £500,000 for care of the elderly.

"I am disappointed that it is a one-year deal but the really bad news is that there is

no promise of capital funding for the Elgin and Forres flood alleviation schemes. There is mention of flood alleviation in one section of the budget papers but no specific mention

of Moray.

"We will continue to put pressure on the finance minister and our Elgin Cabinet Secretary and MSP to make a firm commitment to our flood schemes and we will also be asking other political leaders for a similar commitment to support funding for the four-year period of the flood schemes."

#### First Local Economic Impact Projections Released

**Inverness , 21 November 2011** At a media briefing in Inverness today, Moray Offshore Renewables Ltd published a report detailing the work it has undertaken over the past year to develop plans for 1 500MW offshore wind generation in the Outer Moray Firth.

The power will be generated by offshore wind turbines, capable of delivering up to 7MW each, which will be supported on either concrete gravity base structures, or tubular steel jacket structures. These utilise technology developed by the North Sea oil and gas industry and will allow development to take place in deeper water (up to 60m or 200 feet), in excess of 13 miles from shore. The power will be collected by up to eight offshore electrical platforms, before being sent to shore via a grid connection point at Peterhead Power Station.

The report summarises the investigations of the physical, biological and human environment which have been undertaken, and includes details of the new market for goods and services which the project will bring to the area.

Depending on the successful development of the local supply chain, companies operating in the Moray Firth area could take advantage of this new market, which could be worth hundreds of millions of pounds to the local economy. This could support between 360 and 1400 jobs during construction, and between 130 and 280 jobs through operation and maintenance.

The report will be made available to the public at exhibitions along the Moray Firth Coastline over the next three weeks.



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## Welcome news on jobs front

HREE positive developments on the jobs front have been revealed. Moray is to benefit from 100 new jobs as Capita is investing in its call centre at Forres, while, in Caithness, between 300 and 400 posts could stem from a £20million redevelopment of Scrabster harbour.

All areas around the coast of the Moray Firth are also likely to benefit if an ambitious plan to develop offshore wind generation is realised.

The investment at Scrabster to improve the harbour's infrastructure is important. Creating new quayside space, deep-water berths and heavy-lift facilities opens up the port to a wider variety of users.

The call centre posts in Moray are all likely to be in place by February. That they are in Forres is excellent news, given the economic worries that have stemmed from the recent loss of air force personnel from nearby RAF Kinloss.

Electricity generation by wind turbines is certainly a controversial issue on land, but whether or not that concern will be replicated for a project at sea remains to be tested.



## Moray Firth offshore wind farm 'would bring jobs boost'

An offshore wind farm planned for a site next to the Beatrice oil field in the Moray Firth could support hundreds of jobs, its developer has claimed.

Moray Offshore Renewables said a new report it commissioned estimated that up to 1,400 construction workers would be needed during the farm's creation.

The report said a further 280 people would be required to operate and maintain up to 350 turbines.

Electricity would be sent to a connection point near Peterhead.

A deal has been signed that could make the Moray Firth the biggest source of offshore wind energy in the world.

Aberdeen-based SeaEnergy yesterday revealed its joint venture company Moray Offshore Renewables had signed a lease with the Crown Estate to develop three offshore wind farm sites in the firth.

The project is expected to have a combined capacity of 1000-1140MW, which is expected to supply power for around 750,000 homes.

In January, the Crown Estate announced plans for two new development sites in the Moray Firth and the Firth of Forth.

At least 1200 offshore turbines are expected to be installed around Scotland over the next decade, which will mean capital expenditure of £15 billion to £18bn.

The world's current largest offshore farm is off Thanet in Kent.

News about the Moray Firth development came as Scottish ministers approved plans for a highly controversial wind farm 20 miles south of Inverness.

The Dunmaglass wind farm will have the capacity to power 46,000 homes –double the number in Inverness. It will see 33 turbines, 125 metres tall, erected in the Monadhliath mountains, between Loch Ness and the Cairngorms National Park.

Wild land charity the John Muir Trust has already described the development as an example of the "creeping industrialisation" beginning to surround the park and underlined the need for greater statutory protection for the UK's wild land.

But around 55 people will be employed during the construction phase and the developers have promised to provide lasting community benefit.

Three wind farms to be built off the Caithness coast are to be named after Scottish engineers, following an agreement to lease the seabed needed.

The projects will commemorate Glasgow-born lighthouse builder Robert Stevenson and Thomas Telford, from Westerkirk, near Langholm.

Dumbarton-born Sir Edward MacColl, a pioneer of hydro power in Scotland, will also be honoured.

A total of 200 turbines could be constructed in three clusters.

The developers have claimed that they could generate enough electricity for 750,000 homes - more than a conventional coal-burning power station.

The Crown Estate, which control the rights to the seabed, have signed a deal with the consortium Moray Offshore Renewables.

The joint venture is 75% owned by Portugal-based EDP Renewables with the other 25% owned by SeaEnergy Renewables, a firm with expertise from the offshore oil industry that is expected to be sold in the next few weeks by its Aberdeen parent company.

CAITHNESS firms have enjoyed a strong showing at Scotland's largest marine energy conference and exhibition in Inverness this

Scottish Renewables Forum staged the event in the capital for the third time on Monday and Tuesday at Eden Court Theatre

Ms Smith said: "Mr Ewing said he would tackle this exclusion zone 'head on', reaching out to the area's businesses to engage in a dialogue with his short-life working group that would champion the cause of jobs across the region over the next year. Business aspirations for growth had been expected to be founded on supporting the deployment of early stage devices in the world's first commercial-scale leasing round but the March 2010 announcement of successful developers has been followed by a long spell of waiting.

"Much of the detail centres around the need for streamlined consenting of schemes, as has been achieved for the ScottishPower Renewables 10MW tidal array approved for the Sound of Islay – leap-frogging one of the leading developers past the blockages of the Pentland Firth in March 2011, just a year after the North thought it would see similar activity."

Local firm EnergyHunt, founded by Richard Hunt from his base at Harrow harbour, continues to attract much interest in

Using his scientific and power skills, in combination with industry connections and local knowledge of the seas, Mr Hunt has forged a path through support work at the European Marine Energy Centre (EMEC) in Orkney, local partnerships supporting the power sector across Scotland and the recently announced meteorological mast commission for Gaoh

ergyHunt uses maritime and technical skills to support the early stages of the new offshore wind sites.

These two Caithness exhibitors were joined by a strong presence from Thurso's Environmental Research Institute, part of the University of the Highlands and Islands, as well as local business representatives looking to reinforce links with marine energy clients such as MeyGen.

Dan Pearson, MeyGen's chief executive officer, was on hand to support the company's lead electrical engineer, David Taaffe, giving his first presentation at such a conference, shedding light on the complexities of inter-array cabling, one of the many technical challenges facing the industry.

MeyGen's 400MW 3.3 sq km tidal site at Stroma is in the early stages of development and will hopefully benefit from the streamlining process Mr Ewing is championing.

Caithness Renewables associate Sandra McCaughey, of Sandra McCaughey Business Solutions, Wick, was also on hand to speak to visitors who were more aware of the enormous potential of Caithness and its skilled workforce, having the opportunity to hear first hand about programmes such as the Caithness Chamber of Commerce's £2.3 million Make the Right Connections which Mrs McCaughey has been playing a lead role in since its May launch.

Speakers were focused on technical subjects but most referred to the need to keep the Calthness and north Sutherland public informed about, and involved in, developments, notably with regard to the many job prospects for young people.

Leading industry figure Robin Burnett, of SSE Renewables, which expects to develop 800MW of wave and tidal sites in the region, reflected on Dounreay's legacy, reinforcing the need for public support


